Linda introduces Sabrina Sadler, the Prevention and Education Coordinator for SafeQuest Solano, a state funded agency with headquarters in Fairfield. This agency has offered support to victims of domestic violence and sexual assault in Solano County for over 36 years.

Unfortunately, victims often feel too ashamed to report these types of abuse.

Abusive behavior is about power control, and it may be learned by both men and women and may be passed from generation to generation. On average 24 persons each minute in the U.S. are victims of rape, physical violence or stalking.

Typical domestic violence may be verbal or physical, but verbal scars may not heal as easily as physical ones. Warning signs of an abusive partner may be controlling (isolation or withholding money), jealousy (which isn't love), bruises, threats (I won't let you go back to school), and demanding sex. Victim's gut feeling of abuse may be right.

SafeQuest maintains a 24 hour emergency shelter for women and children in Vallejo and provides separate accommodations for men. They provide child therapy at schools, run an intervention program, give a 56-week class, and can help victims fill out forms for restraining orders. Twice a year they train volunteers to do peer counseling.

Although they agency is state funded, they could use supplemental donations, such as clothing and every day items. All victim services are free, confidential, and multilingual (Spanish/Tagalog/English). 50/50 Raffle
