

Dick Burkhart introduces our old friend, Mel Pearson, who speaks on the origins of the Navy SEALS (Sea, Air & Land). Mel was around when the SEALS were begun in 1962. They were trained in underwater demolition operations and utilized to remove obstacles that might interfere with amphibious landings. There were originally

2 units; SEAL Team 1 on the west coast and 2 on the east coast. Over the years, they have become an elite force of highly-trained operatives involved in secret missions in enemy strongholds.

Mel relates stories of his days of training to become a SEAL. The first 3 to 4 weeks of training, known as "hell week" weeded out many of the candidates. Mel described an obstacle course they had to negotiate, often getting about 3 to 4 hours of sleep during an entire week.

When Helicopter landings replaced amphibious landings, the primary mission of the SEALs shifted toward other types of clandestine operations. It was SEAL Team 6 that took out Osama bin Laden.

which there was only one tube from the tank. If the operator didn't exhale sufficiently, the CO₂ would not clear out of his lungs, and he'd die of asphyxiation. He helped write the Operations Manual for SEAL Team 1 in 1962.

Nowadays, SEALs are trained in parachute jumping, counter insurgency techniques and hand-to-hand combat. Following his first 16 weeks of training Mel added 15-20 pounds of muscle. Out of 120 candidates, 27 finished the full 16 weeks.

One retired SEAL has said of his profession, "It's going to bring out the worst in you. It's also going to bring out the best in you."
