

The fire truck in the museum was our city's second one. It is a 1929 Seagraves. When the Fire Department delivered it, they rolled it back off the trailer, but it had no brakes and almost smashed into Harvey's car. The Homicidal Handyman

It turns out that Harvey (who has been a teacher for every kid around here at one time or another) had a student who's currently on death row for killing 8 prostitutes to "clean up Sacamento." Phil shows a photo from 1869, a 2-story that burned in 1892. However the downstairs was saved and is now the Pizza Factory building.

Horse studding hours on Main St. and other miscellany Horsing around was regulated, back then. Lake

Holdenback was drained, filled and built up north of Main St. Bank of Rio Vista started 1892, later bought out another bank at current location. Curbs used to be wooden. Rio Vista Hotel was built in 1914, gutted by fire in 1917, rebuilt in 1919. Sidwell Hotel (later Ram) was once prestigious, now derelict. Bill Foster was bootlegger who opened a bar here when his welcome wore thin in bay area. He changed his name from Freitas. He had sawdust on floor and girls on counter. Earl Warren tried to shut him down. Thanks, Phil
