Endive, pronounced "END-dive," is a plant in the chicory family, and as it normally grows, it is a vegetable with fluffy green leaves that are too bitter to eat. However, when the root is harvested and stored in a cold, dark, wet environment, it produces a leafy delicacy of various colors. And, now and the name is pronounced "ahn-DEEVE" by the purists.

Endive is grown and harvested at farms in and around California. The roots are shipped to CA Endive Farms and hydroponically gown in a cold, dark, humid environment. The growth is removed from the root, packaged, and shipped to market internationally.

This healthy food is mainly produced in Spain, France, and Belgium.
