Program

Sal Evola and Sarah Davis of Mt. Diablo Resource Recovery present a program discussing the benefits of composting organic waste and applying the mulch into the soil where our food is grown. The advantages of such a program would result in growing locally sourced food of high quality with less opportunity for uncontrolled contamination.

Current legislation requires a 50% reduction of organic materials entering our landfills, this year, and 25% more reduction by 2025.

A. B. 1826 calls for commercial establishments that generate more than 4 yards of organic waste must have a second garbage can. Eventually, all generated residential organic waste will need to go into your green waste can.

The goal is for all residential organic waste to be suitable to be placed in the green waste can. To accomplish that, all food waste will need to first be composted at home, so that it doesn't end up in the landfill.

Some Rotarians pointed out that composting can attract vermin and maggots and produce other undesirable consequences, such as generating foul odors. Sam and Sarah may have their work cut out for them.

Rio Rotary Ski Challenge

Friday, February 27, the Rio Vista Rotary Club for the first time ever sent its crack ski team to participate in the 28th annual Dick Linkey Ski Challenge at Alpine Meadows.

The race is a fundraiser for the Tahoe City Rotary Club and the Tahoe City Rotary Foundation. It is believed to be the world's largest gathering of skiing Rotarians. This year 341 Rotarians of all ages tested their mettle on the slopes.

It takes a minimum of five brave members from a Rotary club to field a team. Team awards are presented based on the averaged times of the five team members. Scratch and handicap awards are given with age, as well as distance traveled to Tahoe City used to handicap individual scores.

Categories eligible to receive awards are teams and individual men, women, snowboarders and exchange students. There's even an infamous Team Turtle Award presented to the slowest team.

With 44 teams participating, skiers' ages ranged from a 17-year-old exchange student to an 82-year-old Rotarian from Salinas. The Rio Vista team placed 26th. Los Gatos, the only group with team jackets, placed first in both handicap and scratch categories. The star of Team Rio was its talented captain, Curt "Flash" Feeter, who turned in the fastest scratch team time riding a snowboard. Feeter placed third overall in the snowboard division.

Considering that none of the team members was accustomed to ski racing, they all did a remarkable job getting down the hill alive. Interestingly, Jeff "The Bomb" Shewmaker fell down, got up again, didn't miss any gates and still came in faster than Ken "Mr. Cool" Wudel. Wudel, who skied quite conservatively at a very safe speed, looked really stylish and did not fall down.

Tim Callahan is an excellent recreational skier by anyone's standards, especially with his new parabolic skis. Unfortunately, however, he was disqualified when he exited the gates of the course to his left rather than his own. Unfamiliar with the area, Bob Bard got lost and barely found his way back to the racecourse in time to ski. Obviously petrified by the course, Bard made sweeping turns at least 20 feet wide of all the gates and still managed to turn in a creditable time.

Following the grueling competition, which lasted about 30 seconds per racer, the team wound down in the day lodge consuming some health beverage. Great camaraderie prevailed as the team's assault on next year's race was discussed.
